EXTENDED FORMAT BASIC LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY**

The next Extended Academy begins in **MAY 19, 2009**. Class will meet every Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 5:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. and every Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. for a total of **48 weeks**. Anyone interested in attending the Extended Academy must follow the steps below:

1. A.S.E.T. Academic Assessment

You **must** take an Academic Assessment offered at San Bernardino Valley College and have a copy of the assessment scores sent to the Criminal Justice Division Office. To make an appointment for the assessment you must visit the admissions office in room AD-SS 100 (see attached map).

NOTE: *If you've taken an Academic Assessment within the last three years at Valley College, you may obtain a copy from the admissions office and have it forwarded to the Criminal Justice Division office.*

2. P.O.S.T. (Peace Officer's Standards and Training) Reading and Writing Exam

Before attending the Extended Academy you must achieve a satisfactory score on the P.O.S.T. Reading and Writing Exam. The exam is held on campus in the Criminal Justice modular CJ-01, just north of student parking lot number #8 at San Bernardino Valley College (see attached map). A practice test is available through the California State POST website at: <http://www.post.ca.gov/selection/poWrittenPracticeTest.pdf>

P.O.S.T. Exam dates are as follows:

NOTE: *In order to gain entrance to take the P.O.S.T. exam, a copy of your Academic Assessment must be on file with the Criminal Justice Division Office before the test is to be taken.*

3. P.O.S.T. Physical Agility Assessment and Orientation

The Physical Agility will be conducted at San Bernardino Valley College. The physical agility assessment will consist of a climbing a six-foot wall and fence climb, a 30-yard dash, a 500-yard run, a 99-yard obstacle course, and a 165 lb body drag. (**Running shorts, running shoes, T-shirts; NO slogans or designs, NO tank tops**)

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS AND INFORMATION PACKAGE

A. CERTIFICATION

The San Bernardino Valley College Extended Format Basic Law Enforcement Academy is certified by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST), and is taught in conjunction with the San Bernardino Valley College Criminal Justice Division. The Basic Law Enforcement Academy has been modified and four separate Criminal Justice courses were created and are taken in conjunction with the Basic Academy:

Police 002 – Basic Law Enforcement Academy	27.75	semester units
Police 100 – Criminal Law	3	semester units
Police 101 – Procedure and Evidence	3	semester units
Police 102 – Community Policing	3	semester units
Police 103 – Introduction to Criminal Investigation	3	semester units

In order to obtain a Basic Peace Officer certificate, each student must enroll and complete the Basic Law Enforcement Academy and the four separate Criminal Justice courses. This change in the curriculum will allow the 192 lecture hours or 12 combined units from the four additional courses to be transferable to California State University San Bernardino.

B. ENTRY REQUIREMENTS TO POST CERTIFIED CLASSES

Students entering POST certified classes such as San Bernardino Valley College will be registered on the first night of the class by registrars from the college. All students must meet the following minimum requirements:

1. Government Code Section 1031 (e): requires a high school diploma or passage of the General Education Development Test (GED).
2. You must be 18 years of age by start date of an academy. **(Note: Most California law enforcement agencies may require the applicant to be 20 ½ to 21 years of age prior to being hired as a Law Enforcement Officer. Therefore, we encourage individuals who are under the age of 21 to pursue an Associate of Arts Degree in Administration of Justice.)**
3. Be able to read and write at the levels necessary to perform the job of a peace officer as determined by the use of the San Bernardino Valley College Assessment.
4. Must participate in all six (6) events of the POST Physical Agility Test. Consisting of a six foot wall and fence climb with a 30 yard dash, a 500 yard run, 99 yard obstacle course and a 165# body drag.
5. Be in possession of a valid California Driver's License, without restrictions, other than required eyeglasses or contact lenses.
6. A medical clearance to participate in the Physical Conditioning Program. The medical clearance form must be signed by your physician indicating clearance to participate in physical training. The form can be obtained from the Criminal Justice Division.

7. Government Code Section 1030 and 1031 (c): require fingerprinting and search of local, state, and national files to reveal any criminal records.
8. Be covered by the Accidental Injury Insurance Policy obtained through San Bernardino Valley College. This policy will be obtained at the time of the academy class registration. The policy is mandatory; the cost covers the student from the time of registration until graduation from the program.
9. Not have been convicted of any felony (and certain misdemeanors) in this state, or any other state or federal jurisdiction. California Penal Code Sections 12021 and 12021.1 outlines and defines restrictions on persons who have been convicted of certain crimes. If you have been convicted of any of the crimes listed, you may not be in possession of a firearm for 10 years, from the time of conviction. Conviction would preclude any student from entering any law enforcement academy.

No cash will be accepted. **Note: All costs are subject to change.** If a student should drop out within the first two weeks of the Academy, the college will return his/her registration fee if he/she goes to the Admissions Department at San Bernardino Valley College and applies for the refund.

D. UNIFORM COSTS

1. UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS

There are a number of costs associated with the SBVC Basic Academy. In order for you to be better informed, this information has been assembled to assist you with your budgeting considerations. Please note that all costs are approximate, and subject to change without notice. Though the list is as

comprehensive as possible, there may be items overlooked. Be prepared; if you need to apply for Student Aid, do so now.

Items that are not specifically covered in this handout, but are items you need to budget for include but are not limited to: Haircuts, uniform dry cleaning, transportation costs, child care costs, “Quick Codes” (Penal and Vehicle), shoe polish, template for printing, flashlight, school supplies, weight lifting style glove, white medical tape, meals, snacks, class potluck, class and individual photographs, class ring, class treasury dues, class graduation slide show film and developing, class flag, class motto board, cards/candy/flowers or whatever might be appropriate to special circumstances. **Males:** A jock strap. **Females:** A running support bra. These are costs you need to factor in your budget. Not everything will apply to everyone, but the items listed above are something you will want to consider. They will add up to a fair sum of money over the duration of the Academy.

CLASS “A” UNIFORM

You are required to have one (1) Class “A” Uniform. This includes: Long sleeve dress shirt, dress pants, black boots (one pair of boots can be used for both the Class “A” and the Class “B” uniform) that can be polished and maintained for class inspections, black socks, 1½” black basket weave belt, Academy patches, American flag patch, Academy tie, Academy bar, and Academy name tag. **All** of the items listed above are required items for **all** SBVC Trainees.

EXPECT TO PAY AS MUCH AS \$90.00 FOR BOOTS.

CLASS “B” UNIFORM

You are required to have one (1) Class “B” Uniform. This is the uniform that you will be wearing most of the time. Your Class “B” uniform will be purchased the same time you purchase your Class “A” uniform, at the vendor specified by the Academy Staff. The vendor that we use has the dye lots on file so we are assured of match and quality. We want to look uniform in appearance. No other vendor has been able to match or beat their prices.

The physical training gear consists of one (1) physical training T-shirt with Academy logo, one (1) pair of physical training sweat type gym shorts with Academy logo, one (1) long sleeve sweat shirt with logo on front and student name on back, one (1) pair of sweat pants with Academy logo. This exact equipment is required of all trainees. The cost is approximately \$80.00. Lastly, there is an Academy approved snap up, quilt lined, hip style jacket available as an option, the cost is about \$48.00.

RUNNING SHOES

You will need a good quality running shoe. A good pair of running shoes will cost from \$60.00 to \$75.00. If you are a runner and already have good running shoes, you probably will not need to purchase new ones. If you are not a runner and do not know how to go about purchasing quality running shoes, wait until class begins. You will have sufficient time to purchase running shoes before you actually need them for class.

E. COST OF OTHER ACADEMY REQUIREMENTS

STRESS EKG

The stress EKG test is strongly recommended for Academy students, **but is not required.** The student may provide EKG results to the Academy staff if conducted.

PSYCHOLOGICAL EXAMINATION (Optional)

The college does not mandate this. However, to be hired by any California law enforcement agency, you will be required to pass a POST approved psychological examination before being hired. If you are tested by an agency and you do not pass the psychological examination, you will have invested a significant amount of time and effort for a goal you may not achieve. Expect to pay about \$135.00 if you choose to process with a psychological testing group called The Counseling Team. If you have had a psychological examination by a POST approved evaluation group within the past year; those results can be placed in your student file. **Note:** The college does not receive the actual report, only a letter stating that you passed/failed the testing is needed. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that the information is sent to the college.

NOTE: Per California Commission on Peace Officers and Standards and Training

“On Saturday, September 27, 2008 the Governor signed POST- sponsored AB 2028 into law, (effective January 1, 2009). This bill received strong bi-partisan support in both houses (77-0 in the Assembly, and 31-0 in the Senate) and support from California law enforcement agencies and organizations. AB 2028 will allow law enforcement agencies to conduct a thorough peace officer background investigation following a conditional offer of employment. This will allow better coordination of medical and psychological components of a candidate's evaluation. It will also reduce costs to local law enforcement by eliminating the need to re-conduct portions of background investigations involving medical and psychological content that could not be initially completed due to existing constraints. POST staff will release a detailed follow-up bulletin to law enforcement agencies providing further clarification of the impact of this bill on the peace officer applicant process.”

FINGERPRINTS

All students entering a law enforcement training program that involves firearms training are required by law to submit their fingerprints to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the purpose of a criminal history check. There is a State of California charge (**not the college**) of about \$90.00 that must be sent to the DOJ for processing. The letter of clearance must be submitted to the Academy Staff.

If you submitted your fingerprints to the DOJ within the past year, you may provide written documentation, provided by the DOJ, that you have been fingerprinted and meet requirements. It is the student's responsibility to contact the DOJ and provide the necessary documentation.

REQUIRED TEXTS

The Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Student Workbooks, students will be provided with a CD-Rom disk with the most recent workbooks throughout the Academy duration.

POST Training Specifications.

California Penal Code: Gould's Penal Code Handbook of California. The most recent edition of the Penal Code Handbook is available at the DMV or Inland Uniforms.

California Vehicle Code: Can be purchased at any Department of Motor Vehicles Office. The cost is about \$5.00.

In addition, available at most uniform stores are compact quick reference booklets called “Quick Codes”. They are available in both Penal and Vehicle Code versions. They are optional, and are of value as a ready reference for study and report writing. The booklets cost about \$7.00 each.

BINDERS

Three (3) ring binders approximately 3” are also required. This subject will be addressed in class. Allow for about \$8.00 per binder. **DO NOT** purchase them in advance.

BOOK CARRY CASE

All trainees must purchase a book carry case; this requirement will be addressed in class. **DO NOT** purchase one in advance.

DRIVER TRAINING

POST mandated Driver Training is provided by the San Bernardino County Sheriff’s Training Center, Emergency Vehicle Operations Center (EVOC). The cost will be about \$525.00; this fee will not be due until the classroom date for EVOC.

RANGE/AMMUNITION

Firearms training is contracted and taught at the San Bernardino Police Department Range. Each student will fire about 2500 rounds. Weapons must be transported in a locked heavy-duty plastic revolver type carry case. They are available at most sporting goods stores. The cost will be from about \$7.00 to \$12.00. The only ammunition fired at the range will be .38 Cal., or 9mm, unless you are firing a weapon of larger caliber that is issued to you by your department, then that will be allowed. The cost for ammunition will be about \$500.00 depending on where it is purchased. It will cost considerably more for larger caliber ammunition. Ammunition is not required at the start of the Academy. Students are responsible for purchasing their own ammunition.

LEATHER GEAR

You will require leather gear for range, scenario training, vehicle pullovers training, weaponless defense training, etc. If you already have it, or you can borrow it, that is best. If you have nylon gear, or something similar, that will also be acceptable. Your holster must fit your weapon, and secure it properly in a snapped/locked position. If you intend to purchase you own “Sam Brown” equipment, you will need to purchase the Sam Brown belt (or Sally Brown belt for women) that fits over your regular belt. You will need a holster that fits your weapon and a magazine or speed loader pouch, depending upon which type of weapon you will be using; a handcuff case, handcuffs, and a handcuff key, (larger than the one you get with handcuffs); a “straight stick” baton ring, (DO NOT purchase a baton); four (4) keepers used to secure the Sam Brown to your normal waist belt; a flashlight ring (optional). Leather gear is expensive, depending on what items you will need, expect to pay at least \$300.00 for your equipment, not including your weapon. The cost will vary depending on the type of holster you desire, your need for additional speed loaders or magazines, and a number of other factors that preclude knowing what the exact cost will be to each student.

WEAPONS

You will require a weapon. If you intend to purchase your own weapon, talk to the Academy Staff first. Expect to spend between \$400.00 to \$700.00.

If you already have a weapon, prior to the firearms training, the Academy Staff must approve it. If you are able to borrow a weapon, that is acceptable and it also must be approved. There is plenty of time to get a weapon. Weapons, ammunition, leather gear, eyes, and ear protection will be discussed at length during the Academy. **YOU DO NOT NEED THEM NOW.** You will need a gun cleaning kit for your weapon. Gun

cleaning kits are available at most sporting goods stores for about \$10.00. During range training you will require three (3) magazines, or three (3) speed loaders, depending on whether you are using a revolver or semi-automatic. The third one will be in your pocket. You do not need a pouch or holder for the third magazine or speed loader. You CANNOT get by with two (2). Costs vary depending on which additional items you will need.

Keep in mind the necessity to change scheduling because of unforeseen circumstances. Those changes might affect your work schedule. That can translate to lost wages, or reduced overtime. People get sick, people get injured, vehicles break down, unforeseen things can happen. Just do your best to be prepared for any event. Plan to spend more than the minimum amount you feel you can get by on.

F. COURSE LENGTH AND GENERAL CONTEXT

The course is eight hundred and ninety six (896) hours of instruction, extending over a forty-eight (48) week period. All students must successfully complete all phases of the training program. Classes meet on two, week day evenings from 5:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m., and one weekend day from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Students shall follow all rules and regulations of the Academy while in attendance at the Academy, during instruction, and any Academy related functions.

Students are expected to report to the Academy prepared to begin their training, which will consist of but not limited to:

- * A structured discipline program designed to evaluate each student's emotional stability, judgment, decisiveness, courage, and ability to make rational decisions under stressful and/or adverse conditions.
- * Regular inspections to ensure professional bearing, appearance, and demeanor and become a part of the students daily work habits.
- * Participation in field exercises consisting of crime scene investigations, fingerprinting, water safety, vehicle stops, building and area searches, and other law enforcement skills.
- * Participation in firearms training, emergency vehicle operations, defensive driving techniques, weaponless defense, physical fitness, and development of a lifelong fitness program.
- * Overall the student shall be put through a rigorous course of instruction and required demonstrative and manipulative skill tasks.

GROOMING STANDARDS

General Information:

No jewelry is allowed beyond the student's wedding ring, and a watch. This requirement is a safety consideration.

All haircuts and hairstyles must meet with the approval of the Academy Staff. Male students are required to be clean shaven at all times. **Mustaches and beards are not permitted.** Hair must be neatly trimmed above

the ears, conservatively short (no longer than 2” in length) and tapered at the back of the neck. Hair must be maintained in a military manner. Sideburns can not extend below the middle of the ear. They must be even in width and without flair. Shaving of the head is not permitted.

Female students are required to wear their hair in a bun, or other style which keeps the hair above the collar. It is expected that the hairstyles will be manageable and properly maintained to Academy standards.

Make-up may be worn if it is in moderation and with the use of subdued color shades. False eyelashes are not permitted. Hairpins, hairclips, and barrettes need to closely match the hair color. No ribbons or other decorative hair accessories are permitted.

Fingernails can not extend beyond the ends of the fingers. False fingernails and fingernail polish are not permitted.

Personal hygiene practices will be adhered to at all times while attending the Academy.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS AND TESTING

The requirements for graduation from the SBVC Extended Format Basic Academy are specified by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST); the standards are set forth by San Bernardino Valley College and the Education Code of the State of California.

POST requires using one or all four of the following methods of testing; the SBVC Extended Format Basic Law Enforcement Academy utilizes all four methods of testing:

1. Paper and pencil
2. Practicals exercise/demonstration
3. Workbook
4. Practicals exercise/scenario

TESTING

There are currently forty-two (42) categories of law enforcement knowledge requirements that must be covered. These requirements are called Learning Domains, hereinafter referred to as “LDs”. An LD is comprised of several training subjects referred to as Learning Objectives.

Example: LD-27 covers instruction on Missing Persons. All 42 LD examinations (or scenario testing situations) must be passed for the student to graduate from the Academy.

Each LD has a specific minimum passing score as designated by POST. The minimum passing score is referred to as a “Cut Score”.

Examinations are scheduled based upon instruction time frames. Students should refer to their class schedule for examination dates. Each examination will cover specific LD’s previously taught. If a student fails an examination, the Academy Staff will identify to the student the area (POST Objective) they failed. The student will be given a minimum of two (2) days, but no longer than two (2) weeks to prepare for a remediation examination. The remediation examination will normally be given within the same week as the original examination.

Note: Because of the three (3) day format of the Extended Basic Academy, it may be necessary to schedule a remediation examination for the next scheduled class date. All remediation examinations must be passed with

the minimum score allowed for passing the original examination (cut score). Should a student fail a remediation examination, they will be dismissed from the Academy if no mitigating circumstances exist.

The failure of a 3rd LD examination shall cause the student to attend a counseling session with the Extended Basic Academy Coordinator and/or Academy Tactical Officer. This meeting is held to address ways and means that may be implemented to help the student improve their grades.

The failure of a 4th LD examination may cause the student to appear before the Academic Review Board for counseling, placement on Academic Probation, and/or other actions, which may include dismissal from the Academy.

OVERALL TESTING PERCENTAGE RATE

The score from the original LD test will be used to compute the students overall percentage grade, even though the remediation examination has been passed at a higher percentage than the original LD test.

Students are required to maintain a minimum test average. This average will be determined by establishing average POST cut scores for the tests taken. A student will be allowed to take the first eight (8) LD tests before being held to the above standard. This enables the student to become acclimated to wording, structure, etc., of the test questions. Once the eighth test is taken, a student who is below the minimum average will be dismissed from the Academy. If more than one test is taken when the eighth test is completed, the test will be included to establish the minimal acceptable average.

To continue in the program, the student must have an overall average of 75.18%. From this point on, the minimum acceptable test average will be recalculated after each testing session.

ATTENDANCE

No trainee shall be absent more than 5% of the total eight hundred and ninety six (896) hours of the Academy (44.8 hours). Students shall not miss any class designated by POST as mandatory. Absences exceeding the 5% rule during mandatory hours will result in dismissal from the Academy. Any other absences that are not related to a death in the immediate family or confirmed illness by a physician will not be excused. Absences more than 44.8 hours will not be excused.

The information you have been provided in this packet should provide each prospective student with enough information to make an informed decision concerning his or her suitability for this program. This program is difficult and challenging. The standards are high, and will remain so. Today's law enforcement officer cannot be second best. **DO NOT ASSUME ANYTHING**, if you are not sure, contact the Academy Staff for guidance. We are here to help you with your career goals. We do not want you spending money for the wrong uniforms, or other equipment:

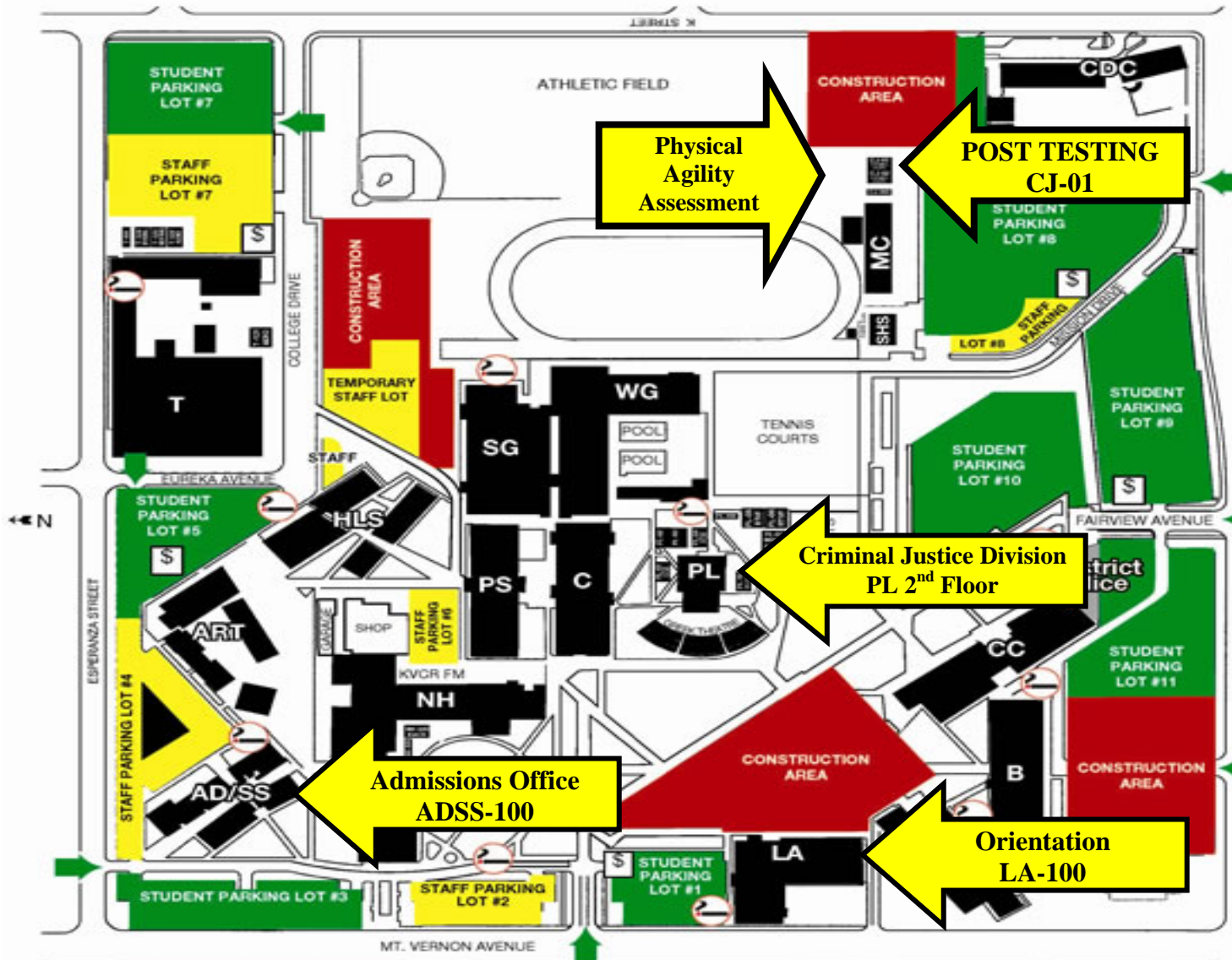
